

Some Helpful Tips

There are always those useful little tidbits of information that can make all the difference in having a great vacation. One great source of info about visiting the Outer Banks is the Outer **Banks Visitors Bureau**.

Shopping for groceries at the Food Lion in Avon can be a certain kind of insanity on a busy summer Saturday, when renters are arriving. Expect long lines at the checkout.



The best thing to do can be to shop in the Nags Head/Kitty Hawk area before traveling onto Hatteras Island. Our very favorite grocery store is Publix for their great customer service, good selection, and amazingly clean store, and you can find them at 1530 N Croatan Hwy, Kill Devil Hills, NC 27948.

Other grocery store choices include Harris Teeter, Food Lion, and The Fresh Market.

If you want to avoid having to go to the grocery store at all, Outer Banks Grocery Stockers in Kitty Hawk delivers groceries and also offers a service for preordering vacation groceries that will be waiting for you in your unit when you arrive. The Fun Stuff

The Outer Banks is world renowned for conditions that are excellent for a number of water sports. If one of the big goals for your trip is to take up a new sport, it's best to make plans before you arrive as lessons can book up quickly.

We recommend <u>Ocean Air Sports</u>, right next door to the condo building. It has great instructors and an extremely good shop to meet your needs. You can reach them at (252) 995-5000.

Real Watersports is also excellent, with a great shop and restaurant, perfect after a day on the water. They are located north of Avon at 25706 NC-12 in Waves, and offer kiteboarding, surfing, and foiling lessons and camps. They even offer lessons for kids.

We also hear great things about Kite Club

<u>Hatteras</u>, which mostly focuses on instruction.




Another great amenity that our condo building offers is a pool that is only for the use of condo residents and guests. The pool is open from May 1st through October 1st, and it's kept locked and is not accessible to the general community. Chairs are provided, and beverages are allowed as long as they are not in glass containers. After a long

day of beaching or sightseeing or watersports, it's the perfect spot to relax.

The condo building also has its own private backyard dock on the creek, creating easy access for kayaking, paddle boarding, and fishing.

Now that we've worked through the "need to know" stuff, it's time for the fun things! There are many, many things to do in the Outer Banks, no matter what you like, as well as some things that you may never have thought of before but might love to try.



The Beach!

Most people who come to the Outer Banks expect to spend at least a little time on the beach. Whether you prefer the oceanside beach or the soundside beach, access from the condo building is easy! The ground floor storage units for each condo have beach dollies to help you transport your gear if you are walking.

The oceanside beach is a five-minute walk from the building. Cross Highway 12 and walk east on Nova Drive until you reach a set of wooden stairs to a boardwalk, with a sign reading Beach

Access. Follow the boardwalk until you arrive at the beach. You can also drive north on NC-12 and find many beach access points with parking and some vehicle access.*



If you prefer a beach on the Pamlico Sound side (the body of water visible from the back of the condo building), there is a nice, secluded soundside beach approximately a half mile north (about a 10-minute walk) from the building. Turn left from the driveway, and continue past Kitty Hawk Kites. Access is an unmarked road (the first turnout, Milepost 54) which leads to a sandy parking area. Cars are not allowed beyond the parking area without a beach driving permit. From the parking lot, it is a five-minute walk to the beach itself.

*Beach driving requires a National Park Service off-road vehicle (ORV) permit, and 4-wheel drive vehicles are highly recommended. <u>10 Day Permits</u> <u>cost \$50.00 and can be purchased online</u> or at the Bodie Island Visitor Center and Lighthouse, 8210 Bodie Island Lighthouse Road, Nags Head, North Carolina, which is along NC-12 as you travel south from Nags Head.



Get on Your Bikes and Ride

The Outer Banks is a relatively good place for biking since traffic typically moves slowly and it a scenic journey heading in either direction. Biking is allowed on all 105 miles of road, as well as on dedicated bicycle paths and trails, and there are routes suitable for both experts

and families. Outer Banks Visitors Bureau offers a number of suggestions for where to bike.

There are several places near the condo building where bicycles can be rented for a reasonable fee:

As well as bicycles, they rent beach equipment, surfboards, stand-up paddleboards, and cornhole boards. They offer free delivery, and also have a bike repair service.

Ocean Atlantic also rents items like beach

equipment, golf carts, stand up paddle boards, baby cribs, grills, and linens, and even has an umbrella setup service.



Time to Tee Off

There are several golf courses within driving distance to the north of Avon. There are also several miniature golf courses in Nags Head and Kill Devil Hills.

<u>Nags Head Golf Links</u>

This 18-hole championship course is located around the edge of the Kitty Hawk Maritime Forest with a beautiful view of the sea. It has a pro shop and restaurant on the premises.

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Come Sail...or Paddle, or Motorboat...Away There are opportunities for boating on the Outer Banks, depending on what you're hoping to do or where you'd like to go, including sports fishing charters, sailing, scenic tours, kayaking, parasailing, jet-skiing, and boat-based kiteboarding lessons. You can even charter a

55-foot topsail schooner for a special occasion celebration or sailing tour.

The Outer Banks Visitors Bureau maintains a listing of many companies that rent boats, offer lessons, provide dolphin-watching tours, and run deep-sea fishing and Pamlico Sound fishing charters where you can eat what you catch.

It is also easy to rent a kayak or a sailboat for a relaxing sail on the Sound, enjoying up close the birds and sea life, and feeling like part of a spectacular sunset.

Hopefully None That Got Away

The Outer Banks is well-known for its fishing and its waters are some of the best in the world. There are opportunities for offshore and inshore charter fishing, surf and pier fishing, brackish, fly and sound fishing, and deep-sea fishing.

The Outer Banks is called "The Billfish Capital of the World," and hundreds of blue marlin, white marlin and sailfish are caught and released every year. The billfish season is long, with the peak for blue marlin in June and white marlin and sailfish most plentiful in August and September. All are caught consistently from late spring to early fall. Yellowfin tuna are also caught year-round.

The Avon Fishing Pier, located 1.5 miles south, provides license-free fishing, as well as a Pier House for fishing and beach supplies and refreshments.

Take a Hike

The Outer Banks has many opportunities for hiking along beaches and forests. The area also has three Coastal Maritime forests in Kitty Hawk, Nags Head, and Buxton. The Nature Conservancy At Nags Head Woods Preserve, at

701 West Ocean Acres Drive in Kill Devil Hills, has hiking trails and freshwater ponds, and a large variety of wildlife.

There are also hiking trails at Jockey's Ridge State Park, which has the largest natural living sand dune on the East Coast, and at the Pea Island National Wildlife Preserve, where there are also observation platforms near the parking area for viewing birds. However, please be aware that hiking on restricted dunes is prohibited.

That Rainy Day Feeling

Even the Outer Banks sometimes experience rainy days! But there are still many things to do even if you can't hit the beach or be on the water. There are two lighthouses to visit, the Bodie Island Lighthouse just south of Nags Head and the Cape Hatteras Lighthouse in Buxton. Both the Chicamacomico Lifesaving Station Historic Site, and the Pea Island Lifesaving Station, America's only all African-American U.S.

Coast Guard station, are good places to visit to

learn about the maritime history of the OBX and

the Lifesaving Service.

The Graveyard of the Atlantic Museum in Hatteras has exhibits and demonstrations on OBX history and culture, talks on the Civil War and WWII, maritime art and music, and fishing history and life-saving stories. They also hold scavenger hunts for kids.

You Can Ski on OBX...


